REFLECTION

This story about the five loaves and two fish, is told four times, which shows its significance, in the four Gospels.

Can you imagine the scene?

Think of all the different people assembled together. The different age groups, family groups. What might they have been thinking, feeling, and learning as the meal came together?

Jesus-Wanting a little quiet to mourn John the Baptist's death, he is confronted by a large crowd who want his attention. John's murder makes Jesus realize more fully what is ahead for him and leads him to begin preparing his disciples for leadership. How does that influence his relationships with his disciples?

The disciples-

- * How did they feel when Jesus told them to feed the crowd?
- * What did they think when they realized that there was going to be enough and what to do with the left overs? * How did this event change them?

The crowd

- * How did it feel to be offered free food with no questions asked in a remote place in a time when food was not abundant?
- * In that day who you ate with was important. Jesus often got in trouble over the people with whom he ate. How did it feel to sit down with huge numbers of strangers to share food?

Us- What can do we in the Berrow Benefice in response to this story?

- * With which character/s do we most identify?
- * What does this story suggest we need to work on a bit more?

It was Passover time in Israel, a time of religious gatherings, of fasting and feasting and traveling. Jesus had healed people of their diseases and his popularity was becoming enormous.

But also, according to the Gospel of Matthew, John the Baptist had just been beheaded by King Herod. John, the Baptist, was the greatest prophet the land of Israel had experienced for four hundred years. A person that everyone looked to for moral and religious inspiration. Everyone, including Jesus, were stunned and grieving by the tragedy of John.

People had looked to him for moral and religious inspiration. Jesus wanted to get away by himself to grieve, to pray, to remember. But the crowds could track his movements from shore, so when Jesus' boat landed, many of the crowd had already arrived.

His reaction as he looked on the massive crowd, was with compassion; they were sheep without a shepherd, a people in need of spiritual feeding. And so, he taught them and he healed them.

After a long day, one of the disciples said: "Lord, the hour is late, and the people don't have any food and we are a long way from any villages. Maybe you should send them home now." Jesus said, "Look around the crowd and see what you can find." Andrew found a young boy with five loaves of bread and two fish, and brought the boy, fish and bread to Jesus. Jesus invited everyone to be seated on the green grass. Jesus took the bread...looked up into heaven...gave thanks...broke it...gave it to his disciples...who gave it to the crowds. And they all ate and were all satisfied ...and... there were twelve baskets of bread left over. The number who ate were five thousand men, plus women and children.

The story continues in a similar pattern a few days later.

You can imagine the disciples discussing amongst themselves, "What just happened?". Jesus, knowing their thoughts, asked them: "Don't you get it about who I am? God of abundance and generosity. Don't you get it that God will take care of you in your needs? Have you not personally seen these miracles?"

For me, the story captures the *very essence* of Jesus as the wondrous Son of God, a God's who is abundant and extravagant with generosity and grace. And his disciples, who don't get it, have seen first-hand, God's miraculous work in their lives.

Jesus can work miracles with five loaves and two fish. That little boy brought and surrendered his small gifts to Jesus, his five loaves and two fish, and look what mighty miracles God did with them. And God wants to do the same with us; that we bring our small gifts to God, our five loaves and two fish, our ordinary talents and gifts, we bring ourselves to God, and look what mighty miracles God can do with our lives.

People ask. How did Christ feed all those people with so little food, with merely five loaves and two fish?" The real transformation then, was not of the loaves, but of five thousand hearts. Jesus said that Christians today would do greater miracles than he did when he was on earth; and if the hearts of Christians were really transformed, could we not feed the entire globe?

There is also a liturgical link. Jesus took the bread...looked up to heaven...gave thanks, broke the bread...gave it to his disciples...who gave it to everyone...and they all ate and were satisfied.

The disciples saw miracles first-hand - but did they understand? Do we?

Jesus, in breaking open the bread, brings forth the possibilities and capabilities hidden in the depths of what is already there in our hearts. If we can be more open, we also have the capacity to do far more than we otherwise could. He transforms us by making us more fully ourselves, by revealing that identity of which we ourselves are - fully unique, and in the image of God.

St. Paul puts it this way: "My God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus the Lord" (Phil. 4: 19).

Since this is so, are we ready to go out to the community, to the world and be prepared to transform the lives of others? Implied in the story is this question: Have you surrendered your five loaves and two fish to Christ? "Have you surrendered? Have I?" Amen.

PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

We are gathered together to meet with our God, let us pray to Him now.

Lord, let us awaken to our need of you and make us hunger and thirst for you as individuals and as a community. Whatever issues we have to deal with, increase our love and compassion so that we long to serve you to the best of our ability in the world about us.

Lord, allow our world to see the true value of things, so that we do things that are worthwhile and meet the real needs of people. Guide our leaders in wisdom and integrity and enable us all to co-operate in the proper care and stewardship of the world's resources.

Lord, as we eat our food this week, remind us of your spiritual feeding. May the meals we prepare and eat together be opportunities to grow closer to one another and to you. May we reach out to those who do not have enough food or clean water. (pause)

Lord in your mercy. **Hear our prayer**

Lord, we pray for all who need medical treatment or are waiting in pain for surgery. We pray for those who need mental health care or those whose lives are blighted by addiction and are seeking help to set them free. We pray for all those who have made wrong choices which have ended in disillusion, heartache and in despair, *(pause)*

Lord in your mercy **Hear our prayer**

Lord, welcome into eternity all those who have died. Have mercy on those who approach death and give comfort and love to those recently bereaved. May they know God's love is theirs forever. (pause)

Lord in your mercy, **Hear our prayer**.

Merciful Father, accept these prayers for the sake of your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen
