READING: Isaiah 35:3-6, Luke 10:1-9

This is the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

(At home, please read 2 Timothy 4: 4-17)

REFLECTION:

We are so lucky to live in this part of the countryside and all the glorious parts of creation that surrounds us. We are in tune with the seasons and all the beauty that blossoms and grows.

Deserts have often been a result of what people have taken from the land. Israel a thousand years ago cut down all the trees when the powerful Turkish government had a law that for every tree, you had to pay a tax. This changed the climate. If you don't have moisture gathering and condensing and eventually you have the beginnings of a desert. At one time, the land was flowing with milk and honey and gorgeous trees.

We celebrated last Sunday at St John the Baptist, Eldersfield, the harvest of our land and sea. We took a car boot load of donated food to the local foodbank, to share our harvest with those who are struggling in our community.

In the Old Testament lesson, in Isaiah 35, it says:- "When the Messiah comes, the deserts will bloom."

The people were in captivity, their cities and farms had been burned, and people murdered. The prophet said, "I will make your wilderness a pool of water and your dry land, I will make into springs of water. I will put trees in your desert: the cedar, the acacia, the myrtle wood. I will plant trees in her desert, and I will make her desert like a Garden of Eden and her wilderness will be like the garden of the Lord. So shall it be when the Messiah comes. When the Messiah comes, your deserts will begin to bloom again."

In many parts of the world, our exploits in the world have led to many areas becoming desert and whole environments on land and sea are in danger of extinction. Our farmers may struggle with the weather and the demands of producing food, but we are fortunate in this country to have a rich variety of food available, brought to us in that network of transport, shops and local outlets. We give thanks to all those who during Lock Down e.g. Pendock Stores, Yvonne and the team and compassionate family, friends and neighbours who made sure food came into our homes.

But Life can also feel like a desert rather than a harvest celebration. Especially after a death of a loved one. Illness. Divorce. Job loss. Loneliness.

Life at present feels a lot like this for many people. Life can be like a desert for each one of us. Inevitably, sometime, somewhere, someplace, each of us will walk a desert path.

In the New Testament, the Messiah came. Again and again, when Jesus came into people's lives, their lives were like deserts and when Jesus left them, their deserts were blooming once more.

Jesus said, "I am the living water. Whoever drinks of me will never thirst again." To drink the living water means to have the Spirit of Jesus come inside of you. His forgiveness. His patience. His kindness. His moral values. His goodness. To drink the living water is to have the Spirit of the Living God come and live within. That is the most important thing that could ever happen to your life and mine.

The deserts begin to bloom when we experience the living water of God's Spirit inside of us. When the living water is inside of us, we begin to dream dreams and imagine possibilities.

We ask the big questions, "How can this desert blossom?"

"God, what can you and I do to make this situation better?"

"God, what can you and I do to help?"

It always takes hard work and patience to make a desert bloom.

Jesus sent out seventy people in pairs empowering them to bring peace, to cure the sick and to proclaim the kingdom of God. Initially, he sent them to every town and village where he intended to go, saying, "The harvest is plentiful but the labourers are few...." I believe this particular story in the life of Jesus and the early Christian Church has implications for our own communities of faith today.

Jesus came among us to preach, to teach and to heal. He came to reconcile human beings to the God of all creation and to each other. Jesus reminded his followers that God's love surpasses their understanding and the importance of living into that love by engaging the ministry of justice and mercy for all.

As Luke recounts the story of Jesus' life, Jesus began his ministry of teaching and healing alone. After Jesus' death, resurrection and ascension, the good news of God's reconciling work depended on a network of people who were witnesses to what God had done. Luke in both his Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles focused on the harvest and the call of labourers to engage the reconciling work of God's kingdom. Proclaiming the kingdom is a communal and relational activity to which the whole body of Jesus' followers had been commissioned.

This intentional empowering and sending out reminds the church today that we need to be engaged in the same empowerment and reconciling activity. We spend an inordinate amount of time feeling anxious about the demise of the Christian Church and forget that like the seventy in the Gospel story, we have been empowered. Empowered to share the good news of God's reconciling work in our world today.

Jesus in sending out the seventy to share the good news, warned them that this ministry was not easy. "See I am sending you out as lambs among wolves." One might assume that in this age of social media spreading the message has become easier.

Yet, in our day the message is more likely to encounter indifference than rejection. While technology is remarkable and can broaden access to people, it inhibits authentic relationship with God and with each other. Faced with this challenge, how do we engage this work today in our world?

I believe Jesus knew what he was doing when he sent the seventy out in pairs instructing them to engage others in relationship as a sign of God's kingdom.

As we strive for justice and peace in our world, those whose lives are impacted realize the power of God's reign to change lives and change the world we live in. The harvest remains plentiful. The labourers in the harvest continue across the ages to be empowered to share the reconciling message of God's love. Go therefore...join with others in the power of the Spirit spreading the good news of God's kingdom. Go!
