REFLECTION:

Today is 'Stir up' Sunday, with next Sunday being the start of Advent. Not just about Christmas puddings, but that God will stir up our wills to do our good works that he has planned for us. On Christ the King Sunday we have an opportunity to assess where we have been, what has been achieved, and perhaps most importantly, where we are going with our journey of faith.

We learn about the Shepherd King in Ezekiel, chapter 34. God says, "I will be the shepherd of my sheep... I will seek the lost. I will bring back those who have strayed. I will bind up the crippled. I will strengthen the weak.'

Our King is like a shepherd who has come to love us and to lead us. We are called to follow him wherever he goes, wherever the path may lead. He came into our world "to lead us by the still waters, to restore our souls, to lead us in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake (Psalm 23)."

As his disciples, we are called to sacrifice, to pay a cost in order to follow the King. We have been saved and our sins are forgiven by Jesus! We look to the future with hope and promise.

Jesus said: "Love one another as I have loved you (John 13:34)." In Matthew 25 we find the passage where the Shepherd King says to the sheep at his right hand, "Come, O blessed of my father, enter into the kingdom that has been prepared for you from the foundation of the world. I was hungry and you fed me. I was thirsty and you gave me drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me. I was naked and you clothed me. I was sick and you visited me. I was in prison and you came to me. And the righteous asked the Lord, 'When did we see you hungry or thirsty or sick or in prison?' And he answered, 'As you have done it to the least of these my brothers and sisters, you have done it to me' (Matthew 25:34-40)." God needs us to be his hands, his voice, his heart.

Matthew records Jesus's judgement of all people, separating the sheep from the goats. Although sheep get all the praise. Goats are not worse animals than sheep. It's just that sheep tolerate

cold better than goats, so shepherds put goats in a protected spot while the sheep continued to forage.

What is the point that Jesus is making?

Matthew appears to record these words which show that Jesus was serious about expecting lives to be changed by his teaching. The way in which we treat others has importance to God, he takes note and there is judgement. To be a part of the Kingdom of God, you ensure success by treating your neighbour the way that you would wish to be treated.

We are faced by many opportunities to help the needy. To be in contact, to care are such things all are within reach of everybody. In these acts of kindness, Jesus is stressing the need for us to take seriously his teaching on the importance of right behaviour now. By doing so, it demonstrates the presence of God within us and by living the standards of the kingdom, we are one of Christ's sheep.

The faithful will see everyone as a brother or sister in Christ and in that relationship, we are part of his kingdom now. As I reflected last week, God's calls us to take the resources he has given us and use them for the good of all, and to be considerate of the plight of the weak and powerless.

In the book of Ephesians, the Apostle Paul has experienced and seen the riches of God's grace, of his mercy, and God's generosity. He uses words like lavish, abundant, immeasurable when thinking about God's world.

The word, grace or gift, is freely given. God's grace is all around you and inside you and beneath life itself. Grace is not earned, deserved but freely and excessively given. Paul knows and has seen that God knows the numbers of hairs on our heads, that he has fully forgiven us, he knows our name, and that he has plans for our lives here on this earth and for all eternity.

St Paul prays for the Ephesians to experience such a relationship with God: "I pray also that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, and his incomparably great power for us who believe."

Christ is our King, who has a kingship in which he

has been refined like gold in the fire. Christ has reached his authority through sticking to God no matter what, through trusting God and believing in God and accepting suffering in order to remain at one with God. And through that terrible suffering, although Jesus died on the cross, He was exalted, raised, and seated at the right hand of God in God's kingdom where he is to this day, working ceaselessly on our behalf, praying for us, helping us, guiding us.

We can all experience something of the kingship of Jesus, merely by opening our hearts and lives to him, welcoming his guidance and listening for his promptings and following them. When we really begin to do that, life in God's Kingdom here on earth has real meaning Although our suffering may be awful and agonising, it can be endured. We can even grow through it, if we allow God to help us.

What are we supposed to be doing right now?

We need strength for the journey. A nudge--or a jolt from a spiritual cattle prod--that will help you struggle up the path that awaits you this week.

What does Jesus want me to do?

Life in God's Kingdom is not about what you have or who you are, it's about what you do. It's not about what the world values, but what God values.

If you love God, if your values are God-values instead of the world's values, if Christ actually is King, then you will love as God loves, give as God gives, forgive as God forgives. If your values are God-values, you can't help but live as Christ taught. **Amen.**
