READINGS: Isaiah 60:1-6, Matthew 2. 1-12

This is the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

(Please read Ephesians 3.1-12 at home)

REFLECTION:

We celebrate the Feast of Epiphany, the story of wise men from the East searching out and finding the Christ Child. The word 'epiphany' simply means 'showing' or 'shining forth.' He is our epiphany. God is at the heart of it.

Light-so important in the dark winter months. The light of stars-showing the way. A story about finding light way beyond the boundaries of what was familiar to the wise men, looking beyond our own boundaries perhaps.

We are all part of this beautiful Light of God, that you and I are called to shine for the world. We can think of the angels of glistening.

Sparks of beauty in the snow and the beauty of the earth. The glow of firelight on the evening. The sun's rising, the moon rising.

Quite often, a star is at the very top of the tree—at home and at our churches. The star brought these wise men to Herod.

"When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him."

The gold represents purity and the royal crown. It is a gift fit for a king.

Frankincense is from the gum resin of a tree that grows in Arabia - and was used to make special incense which was then burned in the temple by the priests as a sweet-smelling offering to God.

The Frankincense reminds us that Jesus is both a priest and an offering to God on our behalf.

Myrrh also comes from Arabia – from a small bush rather than a tree - and it was used to make perfume and anointing oil. Myrrh was used by the Egyptians in their embalming fluids and as a perfume and an oil was used by many nations as part of preparing a body for burial. So, the Myrrh is a symbol of the death and resurrection of Jesus.

The gifts that the wise men gave Jesus then remind us that Jesus is a special kind of King - and a special kind of Priest - one who would offer his life for us to God.

Jesus is in fact God's Christmas gift to us. He is the gift of God's love and presence with us. As the wise men worshipped him and gave him gifts for his work in the world - so do we - the followers of Jesus.

Herod had every reason to be disturbed. Every reason to be concerned. A real king, born to David's lineage, would have more religious support than Herod could ever dream of.

And so the part of the story we are most familiar with continues on by telling us that after the chief priests and teachers of the law tell Herod that the Christ - the anointed one promised of old - was to be born in Bethlehem, that Herod calls the wise men to him in secret - finds out when they first saw the star in the East - and then instructs the wise men to go to Bethlehem, locate the child, and then immediately report back to him so that he too may go and worship him."

Well, we know the wise men don't do that.

They are warned in a dream not to return to Jerusalem, and they depart for home from the side of the infant Jesus by a different route than they had arrived.

Later, Mary and Joseph - and the infant Jesus – become refugees. As a family forced to flee from their home and their country because of the injustice and inhumanity of their government.

Yet, in these awful circumstances in which Mary and Jesus and Joseph found themselves the scripture is fulfilled that says "Out of Egypt I have called my son", and through those terrible circumstances the life of Jesus is saved.

When Herod realized that he had been outwitted by the Magi, he was furious, and he gave orders to kill all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who were two years old and under, in accordance with the time he had learned from the Magi.

When Herod saw that star, all he could manage to see was bad news. But the point is that it's good news. Truth be told, it's the greatest news there is.

So, as a new year begins, as we move from a season of taking stock and move into the Epiphany season of this new year, we are invited to name our hopes for our lives, even when they are small hopes, a new beginning.

The first steps toward a future after such a world-wide uncertain year. Let's trust that we have the strength to see them through, trust that it will get easier, trust that setbacks aren't the end of all our good intentions.

We're invited to acknowledge our fears; and indeed, it's important that we do--but we're invited even more urgently to push past them and to imagine what it might mean to live in the light of that new star.

All our brokenness, pain and worry--the light of that new star can reveal a path of light and hope.

For those who are afraid, ill, fearful. Whatever our fears may be, Epiphany reminds us that we can live our lives in a new light. Epiphany reminds us that Jesus, the light of the world, has arrived in all his rule-breaking, table-turning glory, helping us to see all things, and even ourselves, in new ways.

It is the greatest news that ever was, is, or shall be.

God meets us in the midst of every situation and transforms that which is meant for evil into something that works for the good.

"Take heart," Jesus says, "It is I; have no fear."

May you and I always seek to live in the light of his promise. Amen.
