

# THE SERMON

Bread – the staff of life. An everyday, staple food pretty much since humanity discovered fire and started cooking. But isn't that a bit of a dull representation of the Saviour of the world? Surely the Almighty could have come up with a significantly weightier and more portentous image for his Son? Or are we to take from this that Jesus is – or should be – a part of our everyday. Not something you keep for Sunday best, but a part of the ups and downs of our lives? A vital staple, a sustainer and nourisher as well as a saviour and redeemer.

The prophet Elijah was certainly in need of some sustenance after he fled from Queen Jezebel. As most of you will know, making bread is a relatively simple process, requiring only a few ingredients. But it also requires time – time for the mix to rest, prove and rise – and kneading – giving your dough a really good pummelling to stretch out that gluten. The prophet Elijah had been given a good pummelling by Queen Jezebel. She was out for his blood and he'd had enough. This serving God business was very overrated, he just wanted to lie down and die. And what turned it around for him, was it a motivational speaker, an inspiring podcast or a can of Red Bull? No, it was good old-fashioned bread, and rest. Time and sleep to heal him, bread to give him energy and nourishment, set him up ready for the long walk to Mount Horeb where he hears the still small voice of God.

Everyone in the world has taken a good pummelling in the last 17 months. We've been stretched to the limit, and I'm sure there have been times for many of us when we've just wanted to lie down and give up on life for a while. What has sustained us and enabled us to keep going? Partly I think it's the support we've all received and given to each other via Phone Church, emails, cards, phone calls and many other ways of pulling together, for, as St Paul puts it in our epistle reading, we are all members of one body. And for me the enforced pause which Covid has brought to all our lives, the way it has stripped away much that we had come to rely on for security and sustenance, has helped to reveal what it is that we really can depend upon. Like the dough, we've been forced to wait, to go into a prolonged period of proving and waiting to see what would emerge when life as we knew it started again.

So what has emerged for me? Well, much of what St Paul says to the Church at Ephesus. The importance of being kind and compassionate to each other and to ourselves has been a theme throughout lockdown, and I think we have all become keenly aware of how vital it is to only say things which are helpful, which build each other up according to our needs, rather than looking to criticise and tear each other down. When life suddenly becomes fragile, transient, and even more precious, surely it makes sense to cast out anger and malice, to forgive as we have been forgiven, and to try to live a life of love, as our Saviour taught us?

That's what time has done for us, that enforced period of rest and reassessment we've all had to endure. What about the bread, what is it that has been the one thing which couldn't be taken away from us?

Faith. The love of God, salvation through Jesus Christ and the comfort and encouragement of the Holy Spirit. Faith is the wellspring from which all else flows. An inspiration, a challenge, something which will stretch us and make demands upon us, but will also provide us with firm foundations, some excellent rules for life and the sustenance which will enable us to keep going, keep trying to live that life of love and forgiveness. Because we know that this bread never runs out, this well never runs dry, this God never leaves us to struggle alone.

So when we eat the bread and drink the juice or wine in a few moments time, we do do it to remember the sacrifice Jesus made for our sins, but we also do it to mark the fact that we are fed by our faith, sustained by a daily rhythm of prayer and worship which enables and empowers us to keep going, keep being the body of Christ in this place. Through faith, we keep living, keep loving, keep forgiving so that someday everyone will have the opportunity to listen, to learn, to live a life of love, hope and peace rather than anger, frustration and fear. Amen.

# THE APOSTLES' CREED

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. # THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

The Lord is here. His Spirit is with us

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

Let us pray

Father, we give you thanks and praise through your beloved Son Jesus Christ, your living Word, through whom you have created all things; who was sent by you in your great goodness to be our Saviour.

By the power of the Holy Spirit he took flesh; as your Son, born of the blessed Virgin, he lived on earth and went about among us; he opened wide his arms for us on the cross; he put an end to death by dying for us; and revealed the resurrection by rising to new life; so he fulfilled your will and won for you a holy people.

Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying:

Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest.

Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying:
Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Great is the mystery of faith:

Christ has died: Christ is risen: Christ will come again.

And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.

As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of [N and] all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.

Amen.

# THE LORD'S PRAYER
