We sat very politely through another presentation – this time on Diocese Transformation led by Damian Herbert, the Diocese Transformation Director. As ever I just like getting to know more people and was especially pleased to meet the new Deanery Secretary. It's good to know that Maria Toman has been re-elected as Deanery Chair. One representative gently reminded us prayer should be central to all we do.

And as ever I was reminded of that great saying of Martin Luther – I have so much to do today I shall spend 3 hours in prayer. Gulp!

In all the talk of New Worshipping Communities we are constantly reminded that churches are about people not buildings – I can testify to this from the gales of laughter from the splendid All Age Worship team as they rehearsed for last Sunday's service. And then on the day, there were different gales as the Chancel turned into the Sea of Galilee and across the water came Jesus to the frightened disciples. The theme was – Be not afraid. I'm actually finishing this letter after an afternoon with a really large group – over 35 – from Bromsgrove who had had a super meal at the Duke of York beforehand. I was very thankful to have Rev'd Julie and Ann Ward with me, and I think I can safely say they had a thoroughly interesting time. Andrew had mown a viewing path around the church and lots of great conversations went on about churches and history and heritage in the warm sunshine.

Sadly we didn't have any take up from a Rider and Strider – but we did welcome to St Faith's, a visitor who introduced himself as a pilgrim and who explained he once walked from Tewskesbury to Rome, so the journey that weekend to St Faith's was a bit of a doddle. It reminded me again always to have those lamps trimmed for you never know who might come by.
