Dear Friends,

In Isaiah 5:1-7, "Isaiah's song of God's vineyard" in the Old Testament, it starts off most positively about Jerusalem and Judah. God did everything possible to set up a healthy, thriving vineyard. In our church and in our communities, we have people who do care. We can thrive if we are a people who can use their treasure trove of God's revelations in the world *for* the world. Do we communicate that by our words and actions an authentic knowledge about why we follow Christ? Moving forward with Jesus takes some work. Forgiveness, love, peace, joy, generosity and kindness. We need to press onwards toward that at home and at work-wherever we find ourselves. Pressing on with a God who is beyond our asking or imagining.

God continues to care about the harvest and his vineyard -this world. He wants to see productive fruit. How will we contribute today, tomorrow ?

Wreaths for all 5 of our parish churches will be blessed and laid as we remember those who sacrificed their lives. If you have any additional names to put forward, please do contact me.



You could save a life! - DEFIBRILLATORS

Did you know that Berrow and Pendock parish councils are fortunate to have **THREE AED (Automated Electronic Defibrillators)** available locally?

These require **no training to use BUT** are the best way to save someone's life if they have gone into cardiac arrest – and time is of the essence.

The Defibrillators locally are found at:

Outside Ellis Dawe and Son Ltd., Timber Supplies co., at the Junction of A438/Rye Street (Opposite the Duke of York Pub), WR13 6AS In Hollybush on the A438 going towards Ledbury, outside Berrow House, HR8 1ET (near to the Hollybush Car Park for the Malvern Hills) Pendock CE Primary School, School Lane, Pendock, GL19 3PW (on the wall outside).

The Defibrillators are locked in a cabinet with a yellow case. There is a coded lock and a 999 call handler will give you the code to open the cabinet and access the defibrillator.

If you think that someone has had a cardiac arrest (they are not obviously breathing or responding to you) you should:

- 1) Dial 999 and shout for help
- 2) Start doing CPR the 999 operator will talk you through this, you DON'T need to breathe into anyone's mouth, just do chest compressions.
- 3) Send someone to get a defibrillator if you can. These do not need any specialist training to use. They talk you through how to use them and will only deliver a shock if the onboard computer thinks it's appropriate. You don't need to make any decisions.

Carols, Candles & Cake



<u>The Mysterious Case of</u> <u>the Headless Effigy in the Belltower</u> <u>at St Faith's Church</u>

The 'wow' factor of the Restoration Project at St Faith's conceived in 2014 was to take the piece of Mediaeval statuary out of the bell tower and place it directly opposite the main church door in a created surrounding tomb, in the south aisle. The objections of the Historic Advisers put paid to the plan; but professional research was carried out, funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund. The findings of Buildings Historian Dr Patricia Hughes, FSA, (Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries) produced a list of 4 names: 1 male, 3 female. Chris Guy, the archaeologist of Worcester Cathedral, in his paper certainly leant towards the effigy being that of a woman. The identities suggested were not conclusive.

For various reasons I have resumed my interest in the effigy and I am delighted that Dr Ann Ward has agreed to take on the 'cold' case and kickstart another bout of investigation. Already I am very grateful to Ann for visiting the Hive and unearthing information that will stand me in very good stead for building up a better profile of the church's history generally. We are chasing after an understanding of developments in the church to explain where it was originally and why was it moved.

It is my intention from time to time to drop some articles with the progress being made to the Parish magazine. Please feel free to talk to either of us at any time about the research routes we are accessing.

Finally, I'm going to start at the beginning. I'll never forget sitting in the church porch with Richard Lamb, the church architect, and he said – 'You've got a damaged effigy in the bellower, haven't you? Why don't you look around for its head? It was probably thrown away somewhere.'

Now, would you – residents of Berrow especially – please enter the search?

We are told that two things in life are certain: death and taxes. I would add a third, war.

The first war came very early on, in fact as early as the fourth chapter of the Book of Genesis, when Cain killed Abel. Since then, we have had quite a few wars, and very often on a devastating scale. The Second World War, which killed over 70 million people, must rank as perhaps the most deadly.

And so war seems a topic on which it is right for Christianity to have a view; indeed, the question of war raises ethical questions of such visceral importance that if Christianity – or any religion – did not have a view one might ask what the purpose of that religion was.

Plato and Aristotle believed that waging a war was not of itself wrong: they believed that there could exist a 'just war', that is that there could be a war which, if certain conditions were met, it was right, and perhaps even one's duty, to wage.

During the early years of the Christian church it seems that it rejected this view. It was pacifist: all war was wrong. Lactantius (ca 250-325), who was an advisor to the Emperor Constantine, asserted this view in the *Divine Institutes* and accordingly said that Christians, even if ordered, should not be soldiers. But Constantine was not persuaded. The Romans had created their large empire and gained enormous wealth in part by killing people, now generally thought to be numbered in the millions. He happily converted to Christianity and ordered his soldiers to put the chi rho christogram (i.e. $\overset{R}{\to}$) on their shields, but he continued to wage wars (and generally did so very successfully).

There then came a gradual change in the Christian position: there could, perhaps, be circumstances in which war was permissible. The rules by which the justness of a war would be judged were formulated by luminaries such as Saint Ambrose, who was Bishop of Milan from 374 to 397, Saint Augustine (354-430) and later Saint Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274). This enabled the church, with a clear conscience, to applaud enthusiastically the Crusades and not be over-loud in its condemnation of the domination of South America by the conquistadors.

Nevertheless, there remained a strong pacifist tradition. In Britain, the Lollards, heavily influenced by John Wycliffe, submitted their Twelve Conclusions to Parliament in 1395 and asked that parliament recognise that all war was sinful.

That tradition of pacifism continues to today, and arguably has grown in popularity.

In 1930 the Lambeth Conference of Anglican bishops formally announced that "*war, as a means of settling international disputes, is incompatible with the teaching and example of our Lord Jesus Christ*"¹. This would appear a statement that waging war, any war, was sinful and that no person, Christian or non-Christian, should engage in it.

Interestingly, the Roman Catholic church, together with its Orthodox cousins, aligns itself more closely with the Aristotelian position. It accepts that a just war can exist, and it even has a special blessing for weapons should that war present itself: the *benedictio armorum*ⁱⁱ.

The Methodist Church teaches that war is '*contrary to the spirit, teaching and purpose of Jesus Christ^{aii}* but, confusingly, it notes in the same breath that Jesus' failure to condemn the centurion (Luke 7:1-10) could justify non-pacifism^{iv}, which appears the very opposite of its former assertion.

[It is not possible to say that the justness of waging a war is a matter of conscience. If a man genuinely thinks, after deep and careful reflection, that the right thing for him to do is to push his neighbour under a bus, or kill six million Jews, no one would disagree that he was grossly mistaken. Conscience may often, and perhaps even usually, be your best indicator of what it is right and proper for you to do but we are human and we – and our consciences – are capable of mistakes.]

However, the 1930 statement of the sinfulness of war by the Lambeth Conference, which was adopted with only five dissentient votes out of more than 300 voting, caused something of an earthquake in the Anglican Church. There was no family in the country which had not been touched by the death of at least one of its members during the Great War, and to be told that these men had given their lives while committing a terrible sin must have caused great outrage and resentment. The English Church Union, later to become the Church Union, hid its incandescent outrage under the veneer of a polite rebuttal issued in 1931, stating that one of the 'truths which are in very grave danger of being ignored or denied' was that 'until the work of the Church in the world is done, force cannot be dispensed with[#].

This rebuttal had little effect on the Lambeth Conference. It reaffirmed its views in 1948, 1968 and 1978.

I suspect that the debate is far from over.

Recipe of the month - November

"Kit-Kat" Cake

This celebration chocolate cake idea comes by courtesy of the Revd. Julie James who generously shared her birthday cake with many of us!

Chocolate Cake - requires 2 deep 8" sponge tins, greased and lined

Ingredients 8 oz S.R. flour + a pinch of salt 4 eggs, beaten 6 oz butter or margarine 6 oz castor sugar Vanilla essence, a few drops 4 oz dark chocolate (melted in a bowl over hot water) 1 tablespoon golden syrup (A little milk, if required, to correct the consistency)

<u>Method</u>

Cream the butter and sugar, add the beaten eggs, melted chocolate, syrup, sifted flour and vanilla essence. Correct the consistency to "easy dropping". Divide between the prepared tins. Bake in a moderate/hot oven, 375 F, 190 C, gas Mk 5, until skewer comes out "clean" (about 25 min). Cool on cake wire.

Chocolate Butter Icing

<u>Ingredients</u> 8 oz unsalted butter 12 oz <u>sifted</u> icing sugar 2 drops vanilla essence 4 oz melted chocolate (mixture of dark and milk chocolate or all dark)

<u>Method</u>

Soften butter, add vanilla essence. Beat in half the icing sugar, then the melted chocolate, then the rest of the sugar, little by little. The finished butter cram should be stiff enough to "mould" but soft enough to spread easily. Cool in fridge if necessary before using.

To assemble the cake

Ingredients

2 tablespoons sieved raspberry jam Butter cream 2 cakes Enough Kit Kat fingers to stand up and cover the sides of the sandwiched cake with extra, if needed, to decorate the top of the cake.

<u>Method</u>

Sandwich the two sponges together with a thin layer of sieved raspberry jam and then a layer of butter cream. Cover the sides and the top of the cake with the remaining butter cream and stick on the Kit Kat fingers. Add other decorations as required.

Coombe Green – a chequered history.

The history of Coombe Green's, corrugated iron Mission Hall is interesting. Originally located near Hollybush church, it was moved onto some waste ground on the edge of Coombe Green Common, which, unlike Castlemorton Common, is owned by Birtsmorton Court. An excellent history of the Mormons is in Gadfield Elm Chapel, but I always smile when I read that the vicars of Pendock and Castlemorton refused to allow the Hollybush quarrymen into their churches because of their dirty clothes. Many of their offspring left for the United States and established a very large community at Salt Lake City. Maybe the builders could place a small plaque on the site to remind future historians. We are lucky to be surrounded by so much of interest.

Stand on the edge of the Common and look up at Ragged Stone – two large blocks of granite propped up against each other. These granite stones are over 700 million years old. (In comparison, the Alps are about 44 million years old).

Could man have done this, or were the Malverns once a mile higher, and after soil erosion the stones were exposed?

Interestingly, when digging in our garden I came across two very smooth and heavy granite pebbles and some fossilised sea shells. Surely only made by the constant ebb and flow of the sea. Also unearthed was a small flint with a very sharp edge on one side - ideal for skinning. There are no flint deposits in the Malvern area. Perhaps an indication of mankind being active in Coombe Green many hundreds of years ago.


The "Coronation Tump" is interesting. Was it a deliberate decision to plant two different types of English oak? The iron strap round the trees has snapped as the trees matured. The

date on it celebrates the time when Prince Edward VIII announced his forthcoming marriage, rather than after the actual marriage date, to that American Woman. There was much celebration at this time as it meant that after Queen Victoria's death, our monarchy would continue.

Weddings-Please check the website. www.berrowbenefice.org.uk

At present, we are holding a rotation of services each Sunday. Please check for details on the website or contact us. For the 'qualifying attendance' to be married in a church, you need to attend for a minimum of 6 months, once a month.

How we get you legally wed

We are legally entitled to marry you in a Church of England church through the publication of banns, read 3 times before the wedding date. We ask you to contact your local parish church and arrange when the banns are to be read 3 times there too. A **Marriage Document** is now signed at the church ceremony since the rules changed on May 4th 2021 and then you apply for a Marriage Licence through the **Worcester Registry Office**. We will give you all the details.

Common License

In very special cases, you can apply for a Common License to marry with us. Please do seek an early explanation and the process involved.

Civil Ceremony followed by a Blessing in Church

If you are unable to attend for 6 months to qualify, then you could have Registrar a civil ceremony first. We can then offer you a Church blessing of your marriage which is as similar to a full wedding as we can make it.

Conclusion

Rev'd Anthea and I are ready to help you during this decision making process. Please do discuss the options with us and your wedding venue hosts. We do try to meet your expectations and make this a special day. Do try and attend our marriage preparation day. We try to answer your questions, look at the wedding day itself and looking ahead to the future.

Be safe and keep healthy! May your love for one another be strengthened and bind you closer than ever during the challenges of our world.

Funerals

If you wish to have a church service, please contact the priest to check dates as soon as possible. With your chosen Funeral Director, all bookings and other arrangements can proceed for you, the family and with the help and support of the clergy during this difficult time. We are still requesting the wearing of face coverings inside the buildings.

If you wish to have a burial in the churchyards at St John's, Eldersfield. St Faith's, Berrow or All Saints, Hollybush, the deceased person must have been resident in that Parish. Reservations (which last for 25 years) can be made by applying for a faculty which is a formal legal process and which we can help guide you through.

The Diocese of Worcester has issued guidelines for the erection of memorials in the churchyard. Please contact a local Stonemason who will have these details.



Baptism (or Christening)

The baptism service is for a child or adult. As an adult, you make the decision and the promises. A child has adults (godparents) who make decisions and promises on behalf of a child.

At the point you are baptized, you simply have water poured on your head. If you are considering being baptized or for a member of your family, do talk to us as we will be delighted to help. Baptism can occur during the usual church services which rotate around the Benefice or at a time for just you, your family and friends.

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
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
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
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
