

Dear Friends,

Mark the Evangelist's feast day, celebrated on April 25th, is traditionally known as the author of the Gospel of Mark. There is little is known about the man but it is said he founded the Church of Alexandria.

At some point, it is believed that Mark was Peter's interpreter and travel companion, writing down the sermons of Peter, which became the gospel according to Mark. His symbol is the winged lion because according to legend, he was thrown to the Lions, who refused to attack or eat him. Instead the Lions slept at his feet while he petted them. When the Romans saw this, they released him, impressed by this sight.

One of the Synoptic Gospel writers, his accounts are very vivid. There is the story of the rich young man in Mark 10:17-22, the cure of the woman with haemorrhage and the raising of Jairus' daughter Mark 5:21-43. The story of the calming of the storm Mark 4:35-41.

Speaking about our faith is never easy and in Mark's Gospel we see the disciples constantly struggling, not understanding, and being bewildered by events. It challenges our belief systems about God in the Passion story, who comes not in power and glory but through the crucified Christ. In these uncertain times, it is difficult to see what the near future might bring. The disciples give an example of not losing faith despite the difficulties. They did carry on Jesus' mission. We have hope too for the future because we trust that God has not abandoned us.

April is when we see signs of growth all around us. During Lent, we looked to open ourselves to God, and also looking for ways to plant new seeds of God's Kingdom in our community.

We are the people of the resurrection. Hope is something that springs up when it is not expected. That may be true in your life as it was in the lives of those disciples all those years ago. When you feel like despairing, when you feel that there is no possibility of a way forward in your own situation, look to the hope that Jesus brought on the first Easter morning. And if you think that it is most unlikely that there is any hope for you, remember that the resurrection was a complete surprise for the disciples, so that they could scarcely believe their own eyes.

Easter is for all Christians a time of hope. As we celebrate the raising of Jesus from the dead so we are celebrating the Christian hope that there is life beyond this life for all those people who follow Jesus. But more than that, we are celebrating the possibility of positive outcomes when they seem most unlikely.



Recipe of the month - April

Rhubarb and Ginger Pudding/Cake

Ingredients

- 4 sticks of young, pink rhubarb, washed and cut into 1"pieces
- 2 eggs
- 4 oz sugar + a little soft brown sugar
- 4 oz butter/margarine
- 4 oz self-raising flour + a pinch of salt

Vanilla essence

Ginger to taste (say, 1 teaspoon of powdered ginger)

Method

Prepare the rhubarb and toss in some of the soft brown sugar and some of the ginger. Prepare a $7\frac{1}{2}$ / 8 inch cake tin with a removable bottom. Set the oven at 375° F / 190° C / gas mark 5. Cream the butter and sugar and add the beaten eggs and vanilla essence. Fold in the sifted self-raising flour and ginger. Pour half the mixture into the cake tin, then add a layer of rhubarb, avoiding the edge of the cake mixture. Pour over the remaining mixture. Sprinkle with brown sugar. Bake for 25-35 minutes. When cooked, either:

- (1) To use as a pudding, remove from tin and serve with custard/cream/ice cream. or
- (2) Cool whole cake and slice when cold as a moist cake (You may need a pastry fork to eat it!!)

The cake may be frozen, but ensure it is well defrosted before serving.

If you want to know what *ethical investing* means it is natural to turn to the Church Commissioners (CC), the body which invests £10bn of Church of England money. It invests that money 'ethically' and it does so by adopting a 'distinctly Christian approach to investment'. This approach requires it to restrict its investments in a range of companies and activities, or even refuse to invest in them. You may not be surprised to know that these include: 'companies involved in ... conventional weaponry, ... tobacco, gambling, non-military rearms ... extraction of thermal coal' and so on.

Let's look at weaponry. The CC states that 'attitudes to war and armaments are not defining matters for Christians or for Anglican orthodoxy' and then goes on to say that 'because armaments are purposely designed to destroy human life, it would be inappropriate for the Church to devote capital to, and derive profit from, companies that support an activity (warfare) that, even if conducted ethically, falls so far short of the Christian ideal'.

If you would like an example of *hubris*, this is one. The CC is saying that Christians hold a variety of attitudes to war but, despite there being no agreement, we, the CC, have decided that ideally there should be no war and therefore, even though people go to war perfectly properly ('ethically'), we shall not assist them. Our opinion is more important than theirs.

This will come as bitter news to the Ukrainians. They have been attacked by the Russians and are fighting for the survival of their country. The message to them from the CC is that they are falling below the Christian ideal and have no right to expect to be helped with arms.

You must form your own view of the wisdom of that. You might perhaps think that it is better to be red than dead, even if that means the obliteration of your society, your history, your culture and your religion - and you - but what we now know with absolute certainty after more than two years of bloody war is that the Ukrainians vehemently and passionately reject that view.

The CC also restricts investment in tobacco companies, having presumably decided that smoking is a Bad Thing, and therefore wishing to see smoking (which is lawful, albeit subject to some restrictions) abolished.

Everyone knows that smoking is dangerous but some people nevertheless smoke, and enjoy it. That is called free choice and it is something that the CC wishes to restrict or withdraw. Why does the CC think it can lead people's lives better than they can? If the CC attacks tobacco, why does it not also attack other perfectly legal activities where people might also be harmed or

injured: eating sugar, say, or playing rugbyⁱⁱ, or some other activity such as climbing Snowdon? How far into our lives will the CC extend the imposition of its values?

Now you might think that, however strange the attitude of the CC, we live in a free country and the CC should be entitled to invest (lawfully) as it wishes.

Perhaps so.

But the CC has £10bn at its disposal and, whether accurately or not, it thinks that by making the investments it does it can impose its values on society. That is not an option open to private individuals who do not have the clout given by this great wealth.

Other institutions now also have 'values' on matters ranging from sex to Brexit, and there is a growing tendency for them to try to order the world in accordance with these values. Universities – institutions dedicated to the discovery of truth through debate - have decided that particular lecturers do not share their views about sex and gender, and force them to resign; some banks have decided that some customers do not share their views on Brexit or foreigners or firearms and have de-banked them. These actions have a catastrophic effect on their victims but, much more importantly, they have an utterly devastating effect on other people's readiness to say what they think.

Even where an individual is willing to brave public obloquy and speaks out, politicians, publishers and media platforms live in such fear of criticism themselves that they do their best to stifle dissentient views. The pandemic is rich with examples. The government's policy was at one time that people should wear masks. Carl Heneghan thought that there was little scientific evidence that this had benefit but found it virtually impossible to publish his viewsⁱⁱⁱ. That is a pity. He is the Professor for Evidence-Based Medicine at Oxford and hearing what he had to say might have been useful.

Forming our society – creating its character, its practices, deciding what it will accept and what it will not - is a matter for the people (the 'demos'), and their will is knowable from the millions of views expressed through recognised democratic means and, not least, in elections held every few years. Where people in positions of power, such as the managers of the CC investment fund, impose their own view there is a danger that it will conflict with that of the demos. That may be tolerable in the short term but there is a grave danger that in the longer term it will lead to dissatisfaction and mistrust in our institutions, and that in turn will ineluctably lead to unrest and civil strife.

The legal duty of the CC is to obtain, through lawful means, the best return possible for the people whom it was set up to benefit. It would do well to limit itself to performing that duty.

Dear Friends

David, psalmist and king, says (Psalm 25) 'O Lord, I give my life to You. I trust in You, my God!'

To give our lives to Him like that is not foolish - though not easy. John 3, v16 tells us 'God so loved the world that He gave us His only Son, that whoever believes in (the Greek is *piteuo*, meaning 'to put one's whole trust in') Him shall not perish but have everlasting life.' So, in complete trust we give our mortal life to Him, and so become united with Him - for eternity; which is not foolish!

David prays on: 'Show me the right path, O Lord; point out the road for me to follow. Lead me by Your truth and teach me, for you are the God who saves me. All day long I put my hope in You.'

Today, people talk about 'their truth' and follow that; absolutes are in the decline - which makes life perhaps easier in some ways, yet immeasurably more confusing and divisive (what if my truth isn't yours? What if neither your truth nor mine is God's?) But David asks to be led by GOD'S truth, which may lead to adventure, even difficulty and hardship, but God blesses those who allow themselves to be so led, and they discover His great peace and joy in it.

How do we do it? We start by understanding (whether for the first time or as a restart) that in principle Jesus wants us to stop being 'in control', and let Him lead. His invitation is – 'Follow Me.'

Then we simply remember that we live the real life He gives through conversation with Him. Mostly not an erudite discussion on finer points of theology, but simply 'Lord, what should I do now? Show me.' Or sometimes just 'Help!' Sometimes 'Lord, forgive me.' And we get to know Him by reading His words often - daily; and believing that He really does love us (some find that hard).

May that love Jesus has for us encourage us as all we journey through Lent towards Easter.

At present, we are holding a rotation of services each Sunday. Please check for details on the website or contact us. For the 'qualifying attendance' to be married in a church, you need to attend for a minimum of 6 months, once a month.

How we get you legally wed

We are legally entitled to marry you in a Church of England church through the publication of banns, read 3 times before the wedding date. We ask you to contact your local parish church and arrange when the banns are to be read 3 times there too. A **Marriage Document** is now signed at the church ceremony since the rules changed on May 4th 2021 and then you apply for a Marriage Licence through the **Worcester Registry Office**. We will give you all the details.

Common License

In very special cases, you can apply for a Common License to marry with us. Please do seek an early explanation and the process involved.

Civil Ceremony followed by a Blessing in Church

If you are unable to attend for 6 months to qualify, then you could have Registrar a civil ceremony first. We can then offer you a Church blessing of your marriage which is as similar to a full wedding as we can make it.

Conclusion

Rev'd Anthea and I are ready to help you during this decision making process. Please do discuss the options with us and your wedding venue hosts. We do try to meet your expectations and make this a special day. Do try and attend our marriage preparation day. Funerals

If you wish to have a church service, please contact the priest to check dates as soon as possible. With your chosen Funeral Director, all bookings and other arrangements can proceed for you, the family and with the help and support of the clergy during this difficult time. We are still requesting the wearing of face coverings inside the buildings.

If you wish to have a burial in the churchyards at St John's, Eldersfield. St Faith's, Berrow or All Saints, Hollybush, the deceased person must have been resident in that Parish. Reservations (which last for 25 years) can be made by applying for a faculty which is a formal legal process and which we can help guide you through.

The Diocese of Worcester has issued guidelines for the erection of memorials in the churchyard. Please contact a local Stonemason who will have these details.



Pastoral care is one aspect of a priest's role. The word *pastor* comes from the Latin word for "shepherd." Caring for a person who is struggling with a difficulty, being present during a time of pain, praying with someone in a crisis—these are the moments when we need to know someone can come alongside us from the church community.

Most people only visualise a priest working on a Sunday. The reality is that preparing for Sunday services, Bible Study, and daily prayers are only a small part of my role. Vocations Sunday - 21st April

We often think of vocations in terms of ministry within the church: to be ordained or a lay minister. However, vocation, simply means what you are called by God to be and do. For some, this will be in formal ministry whether lay or ordained. But for all of us it will mean serving God through faithful discipleship in everyday life.

As Christians, we are called to spread the Good News to everyone, to be a Christian presence in every community. Vocations Sunday offers us an opportunity to stop and reflect on our vocations both individually and corporately. Are we living our faith as we would like to? What changes might we make?

There are a number of people within the Diocese who can help you work out what God might be calling you to be and do. This could be your vicar or another member of your church leadership team or community. It could be friends, family, or co-workers. It might be a member of the Mission and Ministry team, especially if you feel called towards formal ministry. Or you might find a spiritual director helpful, and the diocesan Spirituality Connexions group can help you to find one

Almighty and everlasting God, hear our prayer which we offer for all your faithful people, that in their vocation and ministry they may serve you in holiness and truth to the glory of your name; through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Parishes will now be able to apply for grants of up to £10,000 to make repairs to their church buildings thanks to a new funding stream from the national church.

Our diocese has been awarded £135,000 by the Church Commissioners to distribute as a share of the £6.2m fund across the Church of England as part of the Buildings for Mission project. The grants will focus on small-scale but urgent works and 'stitch in time' projects that could save larger sums in the long term. The fund will also be able to help cover the cost of essential improvements for the mission and ministry of a church. Example works might include repairs to roofs or windows, the increasing of capacity in rainwater systems to deal with modern rainfall patterns or the upgrading of facilities to help with access within churches.

The fund will open for applications from 1 March, with submission deadlines every 3 months, the first on 31 May 2024 and the last on 31 May 2025.

Archdeacon of Dudley, Nikki Groarke, said: "Caring for a church building, of whatever age or complexity, is always a difficult task for PCCs. This new fund will help with those routine repairs and improvements, items can often be difficult things to fund from stretched budgets. I hope that our churches will take advantage of this opportunity and apply for funding."


