



Caring for God's Acre

This article could well be subtitled a review of a recent book –

'Church Going, A Stonemason's Guide

to the Churches of the British Isles'

by Andrew Ziminski

The front cover with its testimonials boded well. Rory Stewart writes, 'A beautiful book — Ziminski is a rare and wonderful voice' and a great authority himself, Simon Jenkins says 'A masterly guide to the detail and meaning but also the glory of Britain's heritage'. 'But you said you were going to write about churchyards or the swifts'; I hope I have one or two regular readers who may well remember the plan. Well, truth be I was a bit anxious as over the last maybe 10 years I have felt I might have shot my bolt on things to say about churchyards.

I'd seen this publication – from last year – advertised in a few places and when I ordered a copy, instantly was gripped, and maybe a little surprised. There are 3 sections: second and third, the Church Exterior and the Church Interior; but oh, the first section – the Churchyard - is fabulous, full of description of the remarkable quality of the natural heritage we have here on our doorstep, particularly in the churchyards of St Faith's, Berrow and the Church of St John the Baptist, Eldersfield.

Amongst the practical, historic explanations, are wonderful literary references. Ziminski explains the churchyard might be called the church 'litten' from the Anglo-Saxon word 'lych' meaning 'corpse'. He quotes Henry Wadsworth Longfellow (1842) –

'I like that ancient Saxon phrase, which calls The Burial-ground God's Acre! It is just; It consecrates each grave within its walls, And creates a benison o'er the sleeping dust.'

Though – oh dear, confessions, a quick turn to Mr Wikipedia tells me 'God's Acre' was originally a German term, 'Gottesacker' which translated to 'Field of God' in the early 17th century, but by the end of that century it was accepted as an English term. Yet another example of the great march of language over the years.

The poet John Clare is invoked – churchyards are spaces 'where crowds of buried memories sleep'. Straightaway Ziminski says this – 'I seldom find churchyards morbid or bleak'. I used to reflect I was not certain a churchyard was where I wanted to spend too much time; but there is an extraordinary air of tranquillity and a tangible touching of the past. Of course, often a visitor comes by, to the graves – and I always say 'hello' - or one of those many 'church crawlers' who invariably rock up unexpectedly. Once a very groovy biker arrived in his leathers and as I came to greet him, he said 'I've come to see if you've got any newts in the churchyard'. A reminder not to judge by appearance.

In 1603, an edict demanded that all churchyards be 'duly fenced'. which means this will be the oldest enclosed space in a parish; and so, the enclosure 'exists in a sort of ecological time warp that will reflect something of the ancient woodland or flower-rich meadows they were carved out of'.

How pertinent for now – daffodils were also called Lenten lilies as they were meant to fade on the last day of Lent; and listen to this – cowslips were also known as 'herb Peter' or 'keys of heaven' because the one-sided flowerheads resemble a bunch of keys. It was said cowslips grew where St Peter momentarily dropped the keys of the kingdom of heaven which Jesus had given to him.

There's also this business of the north side of the churchyard. It is one of the curious features at St Faith's that you enter by the north door and so the main burial area is in the north also, which is uncommon. Ziminski quotes Gilbert White who complained that the parishioners all wanted to be buried on the south side. We do think there is a plague pit from the Black Death on the south side of St Faith's, so maybe that played a part in the use of the north side.

Andrew Ziminski describes his book not so much as history of church architecture but more 'a series of vignettes'; the illustrations are charming. Even better pop down to one of our churchyards, reflect on the beauty on your doorstep, say a 'hurrah' for our volunteers, and if you can, consider joining these splendid teams.



Useless Ideas J L Gabbott

This magazine prides itself on providing readers with useful ideas. This article is unashamedly about Useless Ideas and of these I shall give you three: one moral, one political and one legal. There are many more and I invite you to find them!

Let's talk about greed. St Paul had views on greed: he was against it. In Hebrews (at 13:5) he said 'Let your conversation be without covetousness $(A\varphi_i\lambda\dot{\alpha}\rho\gamma\nu\rho\sigma\zeta)$.

That word $A\varphi i\lambda \acute{a}\rho\gamma u\rho o\varsigma$ ('not-love-money') may sound reasonable: there's no point in collecting a mountain of £20 notes just for the pleasure of it. That's being greedy – displaying an immoderate desire for something. The same could be said, of course, about stamps, or beer mats, even though these are not mentioned by St Paul. But if your passion in life happens to be collecting beer mats, or stamps, or £20 notes, where is the problem if the object of your attention is not inherently evil?

But what's wrong with an immoderate desire: to be whole-heartedly, purposely, passionately, dedicated to acquiring or doing something?

St Paul then goes further. 'Be content with such things as ye have', he says. If we had followed that advice I would have been writing this in a cave and telling my children not to dream of inventing the wheel. Today we all want things we do not have - a cure for cancer, for example - and I think it right and proper that we set out to achieve them.

If Mme Curie had curbed her immoderate desire to work all hours in the lab, or if Frau Schubert had limited her son's keyboard time, would the world have been a better place? These people are definitions of the word 'greedy' and they are, I suggest, proof that the concept is Useless.

My second *Useless Idea* is that of 'Fair Taxes'. This is a very popular idea and is often trotted out, usually just before the Chancellor increases taxation on one group of people or another. The reason is obvious: a fair tax is more likely to be accepted than one that is unfair.

But how can you measure the fairness of different taxes? Is it fair that some people should pay a higher proportion of their income just because they are rich? If so, would it be fairer if the poor paid a lower rate of VAT? The top 1% of income tax payers pay 30% of all income tax received: would it be fairer if they paid 40%, or 20%? What percentage would be fairest? There will be as many views on these questions as there are taxpayers.

The Finance Minister to Louis XIV, Colbert, said that the art of taxation was to pluck the maximum number of feathers from the goose with the minimum amount of hissing. So it is today. The aim of the Chancellor is simply to take as much tax as possible with as little political commotion as possible. The notion of a 'fair tax' is useful but only because it fools the gullible; in guiding the Chancellor what tax to apply it is entirely Useless.

And lastly, the *Useless Idea* of 'genocide'. The term was unknown until the 1940s when Raphael Lemkin, a Polish lawyer, dreamt up a new crime for use against German war leaders.

You would be forgiven for thinking that because the term uses 'genus' – a race or species – and 'cide' – killing - it is limited to killing people but that is not the case. The definition adopted during the Nuremberg trials was 'acts committed with intent to destroy, in whole or in part, a national, ethnic, racial or religious group'. You can destroy a group by dispersing it, destroying the symbols and characteristics which make it a group, or by killing its members.

The former part of that definition has sometimes been given the name *ethnocide* but below I use 'genocide' in the sense of killing people.

Genocide (in this sense) is generally interpreted as the killing of many people of a particular group, because they are members of that group. It is murder by a different name. However, it defines itself in terms of a group and thereby it reduces the emphasis we place on the importance of the individual. This might lead some people to think that the Holocaust with its toll of six million was worse than the Armenian genocide when only – only! - a million were killed.

The worst crime which could be committed before the notion of genocide was introduced was murder but, as we have said, genocide is murder. The problem is that we now have two worst crimes - murder and genocide - and you cannot compare the two and say that one is worse than the other; if you could, then the counsel of a convicted defendant would claim leniency because his client had killed only a hundred people, not a thousand.

In 2018 the murder of one man, the journalist Jamal Khashoggi, gave rise to universal condemnation and it is that reaction which is appropriate to the murder of Jews in the Holocaust, whether they were six million or just one.

The idea of 'genocide' diminishes the importance of the individual; this makes it worse than Useless.

And that is my starter list of *Useless Ideas* – which I hope you found useful!

At present, we are holding a rotation of services each Sunday. Please check for details on the website or contact us. For the 'qualifying attendance' to be married in a church, you need to attend for a minimum of 6 months, once a month.

How we get you legally wed

We are legally entitled to marry you in a Church of England church through the publication of banns, read 3 times before the wedding date. We ask you to contact your local parish church and arrange when the banns are to be read 3 times there too. A **Marriage Document** is now signed at the church ceremony since the rules changed on May 4th 2021 and then you apply for a Marriage Licence through the **Worcester Registry Office**. We will give you all the details.

Common License

In very special cases, you can apply for a Common License to marry with us. Please do seek an early explanation and the process involved.

Civil Ceremony followed by a Blessing in Church

If you are unable to attend for 6 months to qualify, then you could have Registrar a civil ceremony first. We can then offer you a Church blessing of your marriage which is as similar to a full wedding as we can make it.

Conclusion

Rev'd Anthea and I are ready to help you during this decision making process. Please do discuss the options with us and your wedding venue hosts. We do try to meet your expectations and make this a special day. Do try and attend our marriage preparation day. We try to answer your questions, look at the wedding day itself and looking ahead to the future.

Baptism (or Christening)

The baptism service is for a child or adult. As an adult, you make the decision and the promises. A child has adults (godparents) who make decisions and promises on behalf of a child.

At the point you are baptized, you simply have water poured on your head. If you are considering being baptized or for a member of your family, do talk to us as we will be delighted to help. Baptism can occur during the usual church services which rotate around the Benefice or at a time for just you, your family and friends.

Funerals

If you wish to have a church service, please contact the priest to check dates as soon as possible. With your chosen Funeral Director, all bookings and other arrangements can proceed for you, the family and with the help and support of the clergy during this difficult time. We are still requesting the wearing of face coverings inside the buildings.

If you wish to have a burial in the churchyards at St John's, Eldersfield. St Faith's, Berrow or All Saints, Hollybush, the deceased person must have been resident in that Parish. Reservations (which last for 25 years) can be made by applying for a faculty which is a formal legal process and which we can help guide you through.

The Diocese of Worcester has issued guidelines for the erection of memorials in the churchyard. Please contact a local Stonemason who will have these details.



Pastoral care is one aspect of a priest's role. The word *pastor* comes from the Latin word for "shepherd." Caring for a person who is struggling with a difficulty, being present during a time of pain, praying with someone in a crisis—these are the moments when we need to know someone can come alongside us from the church community.

Most people only visualise a priest working on a Sunday. The reality is that preparing for Sunday services, Bible Study, and daily prayers are only a small part of my role. Looking after several churches, being on many different committees including being a school governor for our two local schools, engaging in a large wedding ministry, plus occasional offices like funerals and baptisms, means that my working week is very busy.


